

The degree programs are not confined to subjects/course modules offered by individual Departments. The curriculum of the university was developed in such a way to harmoniously improve intellectual, practical, numeracy, IT, communication, teamwork, professional and self development skills of the students.

The second convocation of the university was held on 01st June 2012 and hundred & seventy one students were conferred their Bachelor's Degrees in five fields as indicated below.

The employability of the second batch of students graduated from the university was 76% up to the date of their convocation. It indicates that the graduates of the university are well received by the industry for their well rounding leadership and entrepreneurial skills. ### 4.2. Financial Support to the Students

Financial support to the students was provided mainly through the Bursary and Mahapola Scholarships. The students of the academic year 2007/2008 were paid Mahapola / Bursary only up to September 2012 as their 4 years degree programme was completed by this month.

Mahapola Trust Fund contributes Rs. 2,200.00 for Merit and Rs. 2,150.00 for General Scholarships monthly and in addition to that the university contributes Rs. 350.00 for each Mahapola awardee. Therefore, a student receives Rs. 2,550.00 or Rs. 2,500.00 depending on Merit or General Scholarship, respectively. A student receives a Bursary of Rs. 1,900.00 or Rs. 2,000.00 monthly as per UGC Circular No. 856 and the subsequent amendments.

#### 4.3. Hostel Facilities

All 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> year students were provided hostel facilities in the year 2012. In addition to the hostel facilities available within the university premises, nine houses were rented outside the university for student accommodation. Due to delay in the admission of 2011/2012 batch of students to the university some of the 4<sup>th</sup> year students were also provided hostels in this year.

### 4.4. Library

#### Introduction

The origin of the Uva Wellassa University Library (UWUL) can be traced back to August 2006, when the University was formally established in Badulla. At the beginning the Library was temporarily housed in one of the halls in the University and the initial operations were undertaken by lecturers to meet the essential information needs of the undergraduates.

# UWUL will also share the same Vision of the Uva Wellassa University. The Vision is

"To become the renowned centre of knowledge and expertise for value addition to the Sri Lankan resources base by the year 2015"

#### And UWUL Mission is

"Fulfil the University vision with innovative ideas and to provide the knowledge and updated information to the UWUL users"

UWUL is a collection of sources, resources, and services and the structure in which it is housed, an **academic library** is serving the teaching and research needs of students and staff. The library serves two complementary purposes: to support the university's curriculum and to support the research of the university students and staff.

The growth of the library is very steady and the collections comprised of personal donations, institutional donations and purchased books by the University. At present, the Library is catering to over 2800 readers including both students and Staff of the University. It provides quality services and access of information to the readers of the all degree programmes. It posses a collection covering a vast area of information and helps intellectuals to evolve with universal knowledge. Below charts shows in details of books purchased and donated to UWUL.

The readers could obtain books from the library after registration of the university and obtaining their library membership. Members are provided with following services:

- Reservation of any books.







### **UWUL Services**





There are two types of books in the lending section. That is (L) and other one is (SR). (L) Books can be lent for 14 days and (SR) books can be lent for overnight, and readers must have their library tickets with University Identity Card when the books are borrowed from the library.



### Permanent Reference Section (PR)

This section maintains 4696 PR books Including 177 Hand Books, 165 Dictionaries, 172 Encyclopedia, 40 Glossaries, 70 Standards, 213 Sri Lankan Collection Books and 3859 other Subject Related Books. PR section also maintains Conference Proceedings (65 Full Articles and 24 Abstracts). There is an establishing Periodical Collection, Provincial Map Collection and 43 Statistical Reports. Students and Staff Thesis Collection contains 136 books.

Lecture notes and other reference materials for the lectures also disseminated through a special subsection in the reference section. Newspaper articles section, which categorize under different subjects aiming the user needs, provides fresh news and notices.

Uva Wellassa University Library Permanent Reference Section also contains seven years of past paper collection from all the degree Programs. This collection is colour coded to give user friendly environment. A file is maintained with colour bars for each faculty which easily directed to any individual past paper available in the collection.

Similarly colour coded CD and DVD collection is also available for the library users. It contains 654 CDs and DVDs. Damaged CD and DVD recovery project is in progress with making multiple copies of CDs and DVDs which have higher usage. Electronic book collection under 24 categories is available for the user. This collection provides the newest versions of books until the library receive the printed copies. And this is also aimed to guide library users to use fresh data through primary data sources and partially fill the gap of information technology section in this newly developing library.

Unavailable books in the library (considering user requests) and books with higher usage were recorded and forwarded for purchases through this section. If available, ebooks of these are provided to fulfil the user requirements. Printed and Computerized

databases are available for PR book collection, Past paper collection, Thesis collection, CD – DVD collection and e – book collection for the quick access through manual and computerized methods.

User book reminders, operations are also maintained through PR section. Reminder letters and e-mails are sent through this.

# Information Technology Section (IT) Application of Information Communication Technology

Integrating library functions had been started in February for examining the feasibility in automating library functions in terms of time, perfection, human resources, work performance and other requirements to achieve the final goal of this project using *New Gen Lib* integrated library management open source Software to simplifying the duties for saving the time of the staff to optimizing their services, enhancing the efficiency through application of information communication technology and ensuring the usage of online public access cataloguing services. In this stage, so far 527 Bibliographical and Cataloguing information of books that has been updated within 04 months duration and it was decided that minimum of twenty books can be finished in a day by a trained staff.



Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the UvaWellassa University for the year ended 31 December 2012 in terms of Section 108 of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978

The audit of financial statements of the UvaWellassa University for the year ended 31 December 2012 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2012 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Section 107(5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the UvaWellassa University in terms of Section 108(1) of the Universities Act, appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Sections 108(2) and 111 of the Universities Act was issued to the Vice Chancellor of the University on 18 September 2013.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements 1.2

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

#### 1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit, I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards. Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risks assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. Sub-sections (3) and (4) of Section 13 of the Finance Act, No 38 of 1971, give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

### 1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

#### 2. Financial Statements

#### 2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the UvaWellassa University as at 31 December 2012 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

## 2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

### 2.2.1 Accounting Standards

Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard (SLPSAS) 02 Cash Flow Statement

Fixed Deposit investments amounting to Rs. 362,923 had not been taken into the Cash Flow Statement.

### 2.2.2 Accounting Deficiencies

(i) Capital contribution for purchasing of land and construction of buildings from 2005 to 2011 amounting to Rs.1,571,115,671 had not been corresponded with the Accumulated Fund and a difference of Rs.23,182,533 had been observed.

### 2.2.3 Accounts Receivable and Payable

Following observations are made.

### (a) Accounts Receivable

- (i) Action had not been taken to recover hostel fees of Rs.335,000 and surcharge of Rs.192,442 receivable as at 24 October 2013 from 134 students resided in hostels during from 2007 to 2011.
- (ii) Action had not been taken to recover hostel fees of Rs.37,500 and surcharge of Rs.32,286 receivable as at 24 October 2013 from 15 students resided in hostels for the year 2007/2008 who sat for the final examination and left the University.

### (b) Unrecovered Loan Balances

(i) A loan balance of Rs.163,500 recoverable from an officer since the year 2007,had been included in the total balance of Rs.6,667,335 as at 31 December 2012, without being recovered.

- (ii) Action had not been taken to recover loan balances of Rs.20,400 given in April 2008, April 2010, April 2011 and April 2012 included in the total balance of Rs.53,400 as at 31 December 2012.
- (iii) Research allowance of Rs.90,000 paid by University during the period January to July 2011 to an officer who had been transferred to this University from Peradeniya University, had not been recovered from Peradeniya University.

### 2.2.5 Non - Compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions The following non - compliances were observed in audit. Reference to laws, rules and Description regulations (a) Public Contract Act No. 03 of 1987 (i) Section 12 The procurement committee communicated to contractors that registration certificates should be produced to the committee in terms of the Contract Act in the first instance of the tender procedure. Section 6(1)(a) It had not been checked whether 11 contracts (ii) exceeding Rs.5 million had been registered in terms of the Act. (b) Financial Regulations No.135 (I) Preparation of salaries had not been delegated among several officers for maintaining effective internal control. Every functions in calculation of salaries were done by the shroff himself. (c) Establishments Code for the University Grants Commission and Higher Educational Institutions A sum of Rs.2,576,094 had to be recovered (i) Section 33 of Chapter X from 02 lecturers who had violated the agreements up to 15 February 2013. (ii) Section 1 of Chapter XXIV Verification of stores in regular intervals had not been carried out during the year under

review

(d) Section 5 (viii) of the University Grants Commission Circular No 920 of 05 February2010 Security bonds of 26 lecturers had not been amended when their salaries were adjusted.

(f) Condition No 12 of Purchase Agreement

Retention money relating to furniture and fittings amounting to Rs. 114,240 purchased on 22 November 2010, had been paid on 30 August 2012 before expiring of warranty period of 24 months.

### 3. Financial Review

### 3.1 Financial Result

According to the financial statements presented, the operations of the University for the year ended 31 December 2012 had resulted in a deficit of Rs.55,571,620 after taking into account the Government Grant of Rs.233,700,000 received for recurrent expenditure as compared with the corresponding deficit of Rs.71,556,490 for the preceding year after taking into account the Government Grant of Rs.179,497,898 received for recurrent expenditure for that year. Thus indicating as improvement of Rs.15,984,870 in the financial results of the year under review.

### 3.2 Analytical Financial Review

### (a) Statement of Financial Position

### 04. Operating Review

#### 4.1 Performance

Cost per student calculated on the basis of recurrent expenditure and number of students registered in the years of 2008-2012 are given below.

Following observations are made in this regard

- (i) Cost per student had been increased by Rs.30,539 or 18.16 percent as compared with the previous year.
- (ii) According to the Corporate Plan, 550 students should be enrolled for the year under review, but only 528 students had been registered, Thus indicating that 22 students or 4 percent decrease of the expected number.
- (iii) No income has been generated from external courses constructed under Self Finance Programme in the year under review.
- (iv) Although a director and 4 coordinating officers had been appointed for short term courses, only two short term courses were commenced.

### 4.2 Management Inefficiencies

Following observations are made.

- (a) The University had entered into an agreement with a private company for Rs.3,680,000 to develop a computer system for the use of General Administration of the University in 2006 and a sum of Rs.736,000 or 20 percent had been paid as an advance from the agreed amount. However, the contractor had not supplied the computer system as required and the performance bond for Rs.368,000 had expired on 20 February 2007. However Action had not been taken to recover the loss of Rs.96,000 occurred by the University due to non-supplying of computer system according to the agreement by the company.
- (b) Tender document charges had not been collected from 93 applicants who had collected tender documents for renting out houses to the University, in order to recover cost and calling for applications from qualified genuine bidders.
- (c) Although the Central Bank of Sri Lanka had recommended to construct the University within the time frame to minimize the increase of total cost estimate, the total cost of 6 projects had increased by Rs.89,586,510.

#### 4.3 Utilization of Funds

Following observations are made.

#### (a) Internal Researches

62, 50 and 80 percent of provisions made in the Budget for internal researches had not been utilized in the years of 2010, 2011 and 2012 respectively as per details given below.

- (b) Although 11 lecturers and 93 lecturers under probationary period were in the University in the year 2012 only 07 lecturers had conducted research using provisions made for research and it was observed that action had not been taken to encourage to conduct researches by the Research Committee which is one of the main objective of the University.
- (c) Although a sum of Rs. 5,884,933 as research allowances had been paid to 69 lecturers in the year under review only 47 lecturers had published research reports up to 04 June 2013.

### 4.4 Assets Management

Following observations are made.

- (a) 48 lecture hall chairs valued at Rs. 245,485 purchased for emergency use had not been utilized fully for a long period.
- (b) Five fire resistant safes valued at Rs.322,560 purchased on 30 June 2010, had been idle in the stores up to 31 May 2011. After 31 May 2011 they were taken to ground floor of the administration building and idling as unutilized. Keys of one safe were reported as misplaced.
- (c) 121 Computers, 120 Computer accessories, 175 Computer Chairs and 76 Computer Tables valued at Rs. 15,600,733 purchased for new computer lab had not been utilized for over one year due to delay in construction of networking and power supply by the Central Engineering and Consultancy Bureau.
- (d) 403 square meters of right side of the block G of the University was being used as milk testing lab and 300 square meters of upper floor of the block G building had not been utilized for a long period.
- (e) Machinery and equipment valued at Rs. 35,498,483 purchased for Engineering Workshop, were being underutilized due to failure for setting up machineries properly, recruiting of qualified staff and purchasing of required furniture.

- (f) Kitchen utensils and equipment valued at Rs. 5,668,413 purchased and fixed in the kitchen of 153 square meters and restaurant of 90 square meters for conducting practical tests for Tourism, Hospitality and Events Management Course, had not been utilized for the intended purposes.
- (g) The Prototype studio had not been utilized for the intended purpose, and was being used as an indoor stadium in the University.

### 4.5 Identified Losses

Following observations are made.

- (a) Surcharges amounting to Rs. 1,715,562 had been paid to the Employees Provident Fund due to failure in making payment of contributions in due dates for the period from 2006 to 2011 in terms of Employees Provident Fund Act No. 15 of 1958. Further action had not been taken in accordance with Financial Regulation No.156.
- (b) Eight percent contribution to be deducted from employees salary of Rs. 1,399,116 had been paid to the Employees Provident Fund from the University funds in terms of the Employees Provident Fund Act No. 15 of 1958 for the period from 2006 to 2011, due to failure in deducting the contribution from their salaries. Action had not been taken in terms of Financial Regulation No.156.
- (c) Surcharges amounting to Rs. 38,749 had been paid to the Employees Trust Fund due to failure in making payment of contribution on due date and non submit ion of semi-annual returns on time for the year 2012. Action had not been taken in terms of Financial Regulation No.156.

### 4.6 Implementation of Projects

Following observations are made.

- (a) Power supply unit of the block E building of the University had been established in opposite side where the transformer was located, which should be located to near the transformer. Due to this reason extra expenditure of Rs.1,444,128 was incurred for laying armoured cables from the transformer to the panel board of the building.
- (b) Energy saving policies of the Government had not been followed when planning the construction of buildings. It was observed that power could have been saved, if fixing minimum number of wall fans instead of fixing 20 ceiling fans to cafeteria building near the Medical Centre.
- (c) Following projects to be commenced in 2010 and to be completed in 2011 had not been commenced even up to 24 October 2013.

(c) Extra cost of Rs. 267.46 million had been incurred due to increase of estimated cost up to Rs. 345 million to build the library building which was planned to be built before 01 November 2010 at a cost of Rs. 77.54 million was delayed up to 19 September 2013 due to failure of estimating the requirement earlier. Action had not been taken to minimize the estimated cost by completing the construction within the time frame.

### 4.7 Human Recourses Management

Following observations are made.

- (a) Seven posts of Professors and 84 posts of Senior Lecturers of the approved cadre of the University had not been filled. Out of 192 posts of the approved academic cadre, 133 posts were in vacant position as at 31 December 2012.
- (b) The posts of Probationary Lecturers of the approved academic cadre of the University were 35 while actual number of Probationary Lecturers were 93 as at 31 December 2012. Therefore, 58 posts had been in excess.
- (c) The post of Librarian in the approved academic cadre had not been recruited from 2006.
- (d) It was observed that there had been difficulties in carrying out the affairs of the University effectively and efficiently due to failure in filling 96 vacant posts out of 117 posts of the approved non-academic cadre from 2006.
- (e) 22 operating assistants were in service as at 31 December 2012, due to recruit employees on assignment basis continuously from the year 2005 for the posts of operating assistant which was not in the approved cadre of the University and without filling 51 vacancies related to clerical combined services.
- (f) Two employees had been recruited from a private institution by paying a rental of Rs.35,057 per month for each, instead of being recruited 5 posts of hostel wardens of the approved cadre of the University.

### 5. Accountability and Good Governance

### 5.1 Presentation of Financial Statements

Although, the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2012 should be presented to the Auditor General within 60 days after the closure of the financial year, in terms of the Public Finance circular No. PF/PE - 21 of 24 May 2002, the Financial statements of the year under review had been submitted for audit only on 10 April 2013.

### 5.2 Corporate Plan

The Corporate Plan prepared for the period of 2010 -2014 in terms of paragraph 05 of the Public Enterprises Circular No.PED/12 dated 02 June 2003, had been reviewed and updated for the period of 2013 -2017, according to the decisions taken by the Committee of Public Enterprises held on 21 September 2012. However, physical performance of constructions in Annexure 9.5 was presented as at 30 September 2010 instead of as at 31 December 2012.

#### 5.3 Action Plan

- (a) Performance targets had not been prepared to review physical performance of the action plan for the year 2012.
- (b) According to the Action Plan, 170 students should be enrolled for 04 external courses, certificate courses and diploma courses. However, no external courses had been commenced during the year under review.
- (c) No financial and physical performance had been achieved by using the provision of Rs. 11,280,000 made for capacity development of the University staff in the year 2012.

### 5.4 Internal Audit

- (a) Internal audit activities were being carried out by two operating assistants recruited on contract basis. However, no permanent and experienced staff had been deployed.
- (b) Although a grade II audit assistant post had been approved by the Circular No. UGC/HR/9/01/150 of 04 September 2012 by the University Grants Commission, no actions had been taken to recruit an officer for the post.

### 5.5 Audit and Management Committee

- (a) Four audit and management committee meetings were held in the year 2012.
- (b) Delay in taking actions for the observations made and decisions taken by the audit and management committee were observed. Details are given below.

### 5.6 Procurement Plan

- (a) The Master Procurement Plan has not been updated in terms of paragraph 4.2.1(e) of the Procurement Guidelines 2006.
- (b) Procurement time tables had not been prepared for 08 procurements in terms of paragraph 4.2.2 the Procurement Guidelines 2006.

### 5.7 Budgetary Control

- (a) A sum of Rs. 30,005,417 or 14.2 per cent was saved out of the net provision of Rs. 211,056,300 and after compulsory saving of 9 per cent in terms of paragraph 02 of the National Budget Circular No. 155 on 30 December 2011.
- (b) Total provision of Rs. 2,502,500 and Rs. 10,264,800 made for Rehabilitation of Capital Assets and Capacity Development respectively had been saved without being spent.

### 5.8 Tabling of Annual Report

Annual report of the University for the year ended 31 December 2011 had not been tabled in the Parliament in terms of Section 110 of Universities Act No.16 of 1978.

### 5.9 Unresolved Issue

The University had failed to rehabilitate Waste Water Recycling Project as instructed by the Committee on Public Enterprises held on 21 September 2012.

### 5.10 Fulfilment of Environmental and Social Responsibilities

### Waste Water Recycling Project

The contract for constructing the waste water recycling project had been awarded for a sum of Rs.23,190,000 to the Central Engineering Consultancy Bureau on 05 October 2010. It was pointed out by the water sample test quality report dated 15 July 2011, submitted by the Central Environmental Authority, that the water purified by this Project which had been handed over to the University after completion of constructions on 03 January 2011, was not complied with the standards stated in the National Environmental Regulation No.01 published in the Gazette Notification No.1534/18 dated 01 February 2008.

### 5.11 Career Guidance and Providing Employment for Graduates

Degrees had been awarded for 173 graduates under the fields of Entrepreneurship and Management, Animal Science and Technology, Export Agriculture and Science and Technology by the University in 2012 and according to the information obtained from 162 of them, it was observed that 59 per cent were employed in whatever employment available, 12 per cent were underemployed and 28 per cent were unemployed. Details are given bellows.

- (b) According to the Corporate Plan 550 students should be enrolled for the year under review, but only 528students had been registered and 22 students or 4 percent decreased by the expected number.
- (c) No income has been generated from external courses under Self Finance Programme in the year under review.
- (d) Although a director and 4 coordinating officers had been appointed for short term courses, only two short term courses were commenced.

### 4.2 Management Inefficiencies

(a) The University had entered into an agreement with a private company for Rs.3,680,000 to develop a computer system for the use of General Administration of the University in 2006 and a sum of Rs.736,000 or 20 percent had been paid as an advance from the agreed amount. However, the contractor had not supplied the computer system as required and the performance bond of Rs.368,000 had expired on 20 February 2007. Action had not been taken to recover the loss of Rs.96,000occurred by the university due to non-supplying of computer system according to the agreement by the company.

The unit cost per student for this year has been increased than the previous year due to the reasons of new appointments, increasing staff salaries and allowances, increase of security service costs and other recurrent costs compared to the previous year.

The UGC selects students and allocates to the University. Annual intake depends on the student enrollment policy of the UGC.

Two English courses have already been commenced by the University.

The Coordinators are engaging in operational activities for commencement of additional few courses under the Centre of Distance Learning

The relevant company has informed that amount of Rs.96,000.00 has been remitted to Inland Revenue Department. The Council has already taken a decision to write off the loss of Rs.96,000.00.

(b) Tender Document charges had not been collected from 93 applicants who collected tender documents for renting out houses to the university, in order to recover cost and calling application from qualified genuine bidders. There were very poor responses from bidders still we have not been able to find suitable houses for staff quarters and student's hostels. If a fee is introduced bidders will be discouraged, therefore avoided charging a tender fee.

(d) Although the Central Bank of Sri Lanka recommended to construct the university within the time frame to minimize the increase of total cost estimate, total cost of 6 projects had been increased by Rs.89,586,510 due to negligence of those recommendations.

The University entirely utilized the released allocation for the construction project during the period 2006 - 2012.

#### 4.3 Utilization of Funds

(a) Internal Researches

62, 50 and 80 percents of provisions made in the Budget internal researches had not been utilized in the years of 2010, 2011 and 2012 respectively

Action will be taken to increase the utilization of research allocation

- (a) Although 11 lecturers and 93 probationer lecturers were in the university in the year 2012 only 07 lecturers had conducted research using provisions made for research and it was observed hat action had not been taken to encourage research by the research committee which is one main object of the university.
- Laboratory facilities for research work are not established yet (The available laboratory facilities are not adequate enough for advance practical work). Hence most of the researchers did not start research. Further most of the Probationary Lecturers are on study leave, reading for PhDs and they conduct post graduate research.
- (b) Although sum of Rs. 5,884,933 research of allowances had been paid to 69lectures in the year only 33 lecturers had published research reports up to 04 June 2013.

Most of the final reports, publications/ abstracts were received and some of them which are not given submitted progress reports. Researchers were advised to submit copy of final reports when complete the research.

### 4.4 Assets Management

- (a) 48 lecture hall chairs amounted to Rs. 245,485 purchased for emergency use had not been utilized fully for a longperiod.
- (b) Five fire resistant safes valued Rs.322,560 purchased on 30 June 2010, had been laid in the stores up to 31 May 2011 unutilized. After 31 May 2011 they were taken to ground floor of the administration building and idling as unutilized. Keys of one safe were reported as misplaced.
- (c) 121 Computers, 120 Computer accessories, 175 Computer Chairs and 76 Computer Tables valued at Rs. 15,600,733 purchased for new computer lab not been unutilized over one year due to delay in construction of networking and power supply by the Central Engineering and Consultancy Bureau.
- (d) 403 square meters of right side of the block G of the University was being used as milk testing lab and 300 square meters of upper floor of the block G building had not been utilized for along period.

(e) Machinery and equipments amounted to Rs. 35,498,483 purchased for Engineering Work Shop, were being underutilized due to failure for setting up machineries properly, recruiting of qualified staff and purchasing of furniture requirement.

At present these chairs are being used for academic purpose in block E-1

Action has already been taken to utilize the fire resistant safes

Block D for computer laboratory organized to start work in new semester 2013. Commissioning of Network and electricity supply for block D, E & F were arranged accordingly. It is completed and ready to use for new semester from October 21, 2013.

Right side of the block G is used as milk testing laboratory and testing were carried out until the completion of Block E laboratories. The equipment were transferred to block E from Block G in last September 2013 to start the operation of the said laboratory in new place. However lecture hall for the milk testing laboratory is still continuing in block G.

Upper flow of the block G is used for SDC work and currently is being furnished.

A Lecturer has been appointed as in charge officer of the Engineering Workshop. Services of a technician has been obtained from the service provider with effect from 01/07/2013. Procurement process of the workshop furniture is being processed and already utilized. Continuous Practical sessions will be scheduled to be

- (f) Kitchen utensils and equipments amounted to Rs. 5,668,413 which had been purchased and fixed in kitchen of 153 square meters and restaurant of 90 square meters for conducting practical tests for Tourism, Hospitality and Events Management Course, have not been utilized for the purpose.
- (g) The Prototype studio is not being utilized for the purpose, and is being used as an indoor stadium in the university.

### 4.5 Identify Losses

- (a) Surcharges amounting to Rs. 1,715,562 had been paid to the Employees Provident Fund due to failure of making payment of contribution in due dates for the period from 2006 to 2011 in term of Employees Provident Fund Act No. 15 of 1958. Further action had not been taken in accordance with Financial Regulation No.156.
- (b) Eight percent contribution to be deducted from employees salary of Rs.1,399,116 had been paid to the Employees Provident Fund from the University funds in terms of the Employees Provident Fund Act No.15 of 1958 for the period from 2006 to 2011, due to failure in deducting the contribution from their salaries. Action had not been taken in terms of Financial Regulation No.156.
- (c) Surcharges amounting to Rs. 38,749 had been paid to the Employees Trust Fund due to failure in makingpayment of contribution on due date and non submission semiannual returns on time for the year 2012. Action had not been taken on that according to Financial Regulation No.156.

### 4.6 Implementation of Projects

(a) Power supply unit of the block Ebuilding of the University has been established in opposite side where the transformer was located, which should be located to near the transformer. Due to this reason extra expenditure of Rs.1,444,128 was incurred for laying armored cables from the transformer to the panel board of the building.

- (b) Energy saving policies of the government had not been followed when planning of buildings. It was observed that power could have been saved, if fixing minimum number of wall fans instead of fixing 20 ceiling fans to cafeteria building near the Medical Centre.
- (c ) Following projects to be commenced in 2010 and to be completed in 2011are not yet commenced even up to October 24, 2013

Location of the power supply unit was decided by the University administration in consultation with CECB & CEB. According to them two transformers cannot be established in close proximity. Hence second transformer was constructed left side of block E. However all the three panel boards are fixed at block D,E & F which is ideal for the fixing of transformers. Therefore if it located right side of the block E near to the panel board of the building the cost of laying cables for block D and block F would be very high and faults also be very high due to locating two transformers very closely.

Fixing of ceiling fans are required for proper wind blow during the crowded gathering. Ceiling fans were fixed to get proper wind top of the area which is locating dining tables. Wall fans are not adequate to get the wind for the corners of the cafeteria. Further this was designed with the consultation of canteen designers and they certify the arrangement is needed eliminate flys and other insects from the cafeteria.

The University has predicted the requirement correctly as per the student enrolment plan. The planned activities should be changed according to policy decisions of the Government to increase the student intake annually.

In addition to above the following reasons also delayed the project items

a. The land slides taken place in year 2010 and around 4.5 hectare could not be utilized from the University land and therefore the planned buildings were relocated. failure of prediction of requirement earlier. Action had not been taken to minimize the estimated cost by completing the contract within the time frame.

#### 4.7 Human Resource Management

(a) Seven posts of Professors and 84 posts of Senior Lecturers of the approved cadre of the University had not been recruited. Out of 192 posts of the approved academic cadre, 133 posts were vacant as at 31 December 2012.

- (b) The posts of Probationary Lecturers of the approved academic cadre of the University were 35 while actual numbers of Probationary Lecturers were 93 as at 31 December 2012. Therefore, 58 posts had been in excess.
- (c) The post of Librarian of the approved academic cadre had not been recruited from 2006.

- Non receipt of requested annual allocation for construction project items
- c. Certain project items could not be commenced due to Court case regarding industrialist occupying University land.
- d. Project completion time period depends on the granted annual allocation by the Treasury.

The following actions have been taken to fill the vacancies.

- a. The University has recruited the following academic staff during the period from January to September 2013
  - 1. Senior Lecturer 06
  - 2. Lecturer(Probationary) 09
  - 3. Temporary Lecturer 06
  - 4. Temporary Demonstrator 14
- b. Inviting senior academic members of other universities to spend the sabbatical leave period at Uva Wellassa University.
- c. Inviting scientists from other countries for exchange programs.
- d. Appointing Resource Persons from the industry as visiting faculty

Even though the newspaper advertisements are published for the post of Senior Lecturers, in the circumstances where they cannot be recruited, Lecturers (probationary) are recruited. Further, they are promoted to the post of Senior Lecturer once they complete the necessary qualifications.

Even though the newspaper advertisements were published for the post of Librarian, a Librarian was not recruited since there was no qualified candidate (d) It was observed that there had been difficulties in carrying out the affairs of the university effectively and efficiently due to failure in filling 96 vacant posts out of 117 posts of the approved non-academic cadre from 2006.

for this position. However, necessary actions were taken to recruit two Assistant Librarians.

The University and the Council continuously requested to create new cadre of Operations Assistant since 2006, and additionally requested on this matter dated May 10, 2013 under the suggestion of innovations for the development of the Universities. This request has not been accepted so far. The University is requesting for this position since there is the need to continue the University with no over time payment, weekend allowance, other disturbances and any tensed and stressed situations in addition to the need of having a University with novel features as to the wish of people who are linked with the University.

- (e) 22 Operating Assistants were in service as at 31 December 2012, due to recruit employees on assignment basis from the year 2005 for the posts of operating assistant which was not in the approved cadre of the University and without filling 51 vacancies related to clerical combined services
- (f) Two employees had been recruited from a private institution by paying a rental of Rs.35,057 for each per month, instead of being recruited 5 posts of hostel wardens of the approved cadre of the University.

Recruitment process has already been commenced by calling applications from the Universities.

### 5. Accountability and Good Governance

#### 5.1 Presentation of Financial Statements

- (b) According to the Action Plan 170 students should be enrolled for 04 external courses, certificate courses and diploma courses, but no external courses had been commenced for the year under review.
- (c) No financial and physical performance had been achieved by using the provision of Rs. 11,280,000 of provision made for capacity development of university staff in the year 2012.

Steps have been already taken to prepare the performance targets to review Action plan.

Action has already been taken to commence 02 external English certificate courses

The Council has taken a decision to provide the financial assistance to Probationary Lecturers for Master/PhD programs under the budget allocation of Knowledge Enhancement and Institutional Development. Action has already been taken to select the Lecturers for this program.

### 5.4 Internal Audit

### 5.7 Budgetary Control

- (a) Rs. 30,005,417 or 14.2 percent was saved out of net provision of Rs. 211,056,300 after compulsory saving of 9 percent in terms of paragraph 02 of the National Budget Circular No. 155 on 30 December 2011, the provision made for capital expenditure of Rs. 231,930,000 for the university.
- (b) Total provision of Rs. 2,502,500 and Rs. 10,264,800 provided for Rehabilitation of Capital Assets and Capacity Development respectively had been saved without spending.

### 5.8 Tabling of Annual Report

Annual report of the University for the year ended 31 December 2011 had not been tabled in the parliament.

### 5.9 Unresolved Issue

The University had failed to rehabilitate Waste Water Recycling Project as instructed by the Committee on Public Enterprises held on 21 September 2012.

# 5.10 Fulfillment of Environmental and Social Responsibilities

### **Waste Water Recycling Project**

The contract for constructing the waste water recycling project had been awarded for a sum of Rs.23,190,000 to the Central Engineering Consultancy Bureau on 05 October 2010. It was pointed out by the water sample test quality report dated 15 July 2011, submitted by the

Capital expenditure for the year was below the target due to non receipt of requested cash imprest from Treasury as planned.

Degrees had been awarded for 173 graduates under the fields of Entrepreneurship and Management, Animal Science and Technology, Export Agriculture and Science and Technology by the university in 2012 and according to information obtained from 162 of them, it was observed that 59 percent were employed in whatever employment available, 12 per cent were under employed and 28 per cent were unemployed

The career guidance unit has been established in this year. Director and other committee members were already appointed to the unit. The committee has already been taken the actions to increase the employability opportunities of the passed out graduates.
